

Southeast Blufflands

The distinctive "driftless" region of southeast
Minnesota was largely untouched by the most recent
glaciation and is characterized by forests and prairies
threaded by wandering trout streams and the
Mississippi River and its tributaries. Nowhere else in
the state can you find these limestone cliffs with their
dramatic views of river valleys. This region is the most
biodiverse area in Minnesota, yet it faces declining
habitat for the 183 species of state listed rare plants
and animals that reside there. Although the blufflands
region is rich with diverse geology, wildlife habitat and
recreation potential, less than 5 percent is protected
and open for public use.


WHAT WE DO

Protecting large contiguous blocks of land allows public land managers to restore, enhance, and maintain high quality habitat at a scale that cannot occur with the current fragmented ownership. Protecting these lands provides much needed public access and will ensure the legacy of the blufflands is preserved for future generations.

Together with partners, Trust for Public Land is working with communities and the MN DNR to expand, restore, enhance, and connect public land in the blufflands area. Trust for Public Land is protecting high-priority property to conserve habitat and provide land for people to enjoy.

RECENT WINS FOR CONSERVATION

- Choice Wildlife Management Area Additions: Trust for Public Land has added 480 acres to the Choice
 Wildlife Management Area and protected a mile of Heritage Brook Trout stream, Maple Creek. Acquired in
 three separate phases, these blufflands with oak savannah overlook the South Fork of the Root River—one
 of the best trout streams in the Midwest.
- Yucatan Wildlife Management Area: Formerly operated as a Girl Scout camp, Trust for Public Land successfully protected these 840 acres from development in partnership with the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources, so that the Yucatan WMA is now available for everyone to enjoy.
- Root River Park: This Olmsted County Park includes a section of an 1800 era stagecoach trail and
 connects previously conserved land. Trust for Public Land helped protect 90 acres of biologically significant
 land, and created new opportunities for canoeing, fishing, picnicking, and camping.
